Gentlemen

Respecting your invitation,
 I beg to send you the following remarks
 on the Last Valuation, in which I
 am interested.

Kelvedon £175.-
 This I think ought to be reduced
 to £150.

On many accounts the Annual
 Value of the property has become
 less in the District than when the
 first Valuation Roll was compiled.
 In addition to the attacks of

Aphis &c. I have suffered severely from Rust. at Kelleedor.

- Grange - £300 -

You have omitted from Roll the names of the Tenant and Occupiers, Henry Cottar and Francis Cottar jun^r.

Francis Cottar jun^r. rents about 2000 acres.

The heavy floods of last year. & the year before. have very much deteriorated the annual value of this Land. - a very heavy embankment put up by the Tenant. at a great cost. was swept away in gaps to the level of the ground; and some 15 or 20 acres of arable land under the crop thereon swept away also.

The other portion of the Grange is let to Henry Cottar, and can only be valued as a sheep Run. The agriculturist Mr. Blight and his wife having been of adverse character two years. and having nearly returned the expense of cultivation.

With seasons as they are to be £300 is a fair valuation. - but now the whole of the Estate is not worth more than £250 per annum. which sum I trust you will reduce it, in the whole.

- Crows Land.

The larger portion of this land is at the Ratty Hills and is very inferior. - the quality is about 1500 acres. the value, as com-

paid with the general rent
of the Land in Little Swarkestone
is about half what that is valued
at, and I think ought to be reduced
to £12. per annum.

The 350 acres of the Grange is
valued at at £1.15 per acre.
and is too highly valued at £5.
